OUR AIM...

is to provide the motorway driver with access to roadside assistance.

Roads Service has provided 200 new emergency telephones along the motorway network as part of a £6 million project to improve motorway communication and extend motorway control.



Motorway Safety

If your vehicle develops a problem on the motorway and you cannot leave at an exit: -

Pull on to the hard shoulder and stop as far to the left as possible.

Try to stop near an emergency telephone

Switch on hazard lights and leave the vehicle using the left-hand door ensuring all passengers do the same.



You **MUST** leave any animals inside the vehicle.

Ensure your passengers keep away from the carriageway and hard shoulder and that children are kept under control.

Do not attempt even simple repairs

Walk to an emergency telephone on your side of the carriageway by following the arrows on the marker posts at the back of the hard shoulder. The telephones are located at intervals of 1 mile along the motorway.

How to use a Motorway Emergency Telephone

A motorway telephone gives you a **FREE** connection to the police motorway desk

- 1 Be prepared to state:-
 - Nature of problem
 - Your name
 - Vehicle details
 - If applicable, membership number of motoring organisation

- 2 Lift handset, listen for ringing tone and wait for operator

- 3 Speak clearly into mouthpiece

- 4 Replace handset after use

- 5 Return and wait near your vehicle (well away from the carriageway and hard shoulder) or in your car if you feel at risk from another person
